### **Van Walleghem**


Wilbur Van Walleghem, an original shareholder of the Pembina Curling Club, started his curling in the early 1940's, on Sunday mornings, at the old Eaton Curling Club on Mayfair Ave. He continued and became a long time member of the Belgian Curling League. In 1971, when the Pembina Old Timers League was formed, he entered a team and curled for eight years.

Albert Van Walleghem started curling with his father in 1953. In 1958, when the Pembina Curling Club installed artificial ice, he entered a team into the Pembina Men's League. He soon joined the executive and became President in 1976-1977. His claim to fame was representing Manitoba in the Canadian Farmers Championship in 1965 and 1967. Albert's daughters Cheryl and Lisa began their curling in the Pembina Junior Girls League.

George Van Walleghems family all curled at Pembina. George with the men's league and Francis with the St. Pauls Ladies League. All eight children, Michael, Karen, Brenda, Gregory, David, Janet, Peter and Danielle began their curling in the girls and boys Junior Leagues. Gregory became President of the Men's club in 1994-1995.

Daughter, Marlene Cleutinx, and her family all started their curling at the Pembina, she with the St. Pauls Ladies and the Pembina Rockettes Leagues. Her husband Laurie curled in the Men's League and became President in the 1980-1981 season. Sons Dan, Fred and Bob all started in the Junior Men's League. As Juniors they were twice runners-up in the Provincial Junior Playdowns in 1981-82 and 1982-1983. Marlene had the most success of all, representing Manitoba in the Canadian Mixed Championship in 1983 and the Canadian Senior Ladies Championship in 1988.

One of the highlights of the Van Walleghem families was taking part in the Annual Belgian Bonspiel held each spring at the Pembina Curling Club.

## Dusessoy



Leo was also a founding member of the Pembina Old Timers League becoming President in 1970 until 1974, guiding the league in its formative years. Leo passed away on July 7, 1975 and the family donated the Dusessoy Trophy for Pembina Men's Club Champions in his memory.

## CONGRATULATIONS TO ALL

## *Ten Commandments of a Curler.*

1. Thou shalt have no other game before me, for I am the roarin' game which was in the beginning (even in the stone age), is now and ever shall be
2. Come not upon the ice with the old house broom. Thou canst not quicken the pace of a dying rock with last year's broom.
3. Thou shalt learn thy turns both the out and the in, for the skip will not hold him guiltless who throweth the wrong turn.
4. Plan not a running shot when thou art asked for a guard, lest thee raise thine own shot, so sending thy skip up in the air; such play getteth his goat, queereth his game, causeth him to swallow his tobacco, and revile thee openly.
5. Thou shalt hearken diligently to the defeated skip when his voice is lifted up in lamentation against the punk ice, and thou shalt not turn thy face from him when he blameth his third man. Even so shalt thou secure a listener against the day of thine own defeat.
6. Thou shalt not strew straws off thy broom in the path of thine own or thine adversary's rock, neither shalt thou expectorate in front of them causing them to halt in their course and to die suddenly and become a hog, and as pork is an abomination to the Jew, so is a hog an abomination in the eyes of a skip.

## PEMBINA LADIES CURLING CLUB

In the autumn of 1947 Betty (Mitchell) Smith was asked to form a Pembina Ladies Curling Club. She invited a number of ladies whom she knew to join the club. She then contacted everyone with a Fort Garry address that was listed in the Winnipeg telephone directory. Some responses came back indicating that "they did not skate" and therefore were not interested. Other responses indicated that "they had never seen a game of curling".

An organizational meeting was held later that fall in the old municipal hall at Pembina Hwy. and Chevrier Blvd. Mrs. Beach and Mrs. Phillips from the Manitoba Ladies Curling Association attended the meeting. Mrs. Johnston and Mrs. Farwell chaired that meeting.

A club of 24 members was inaugurated and they curled their first draw in the last week of December 1947. Curling fees for the first year were \$6.00. Their wind-up banquet was held at Moores Restaurant on Portage Ave.

It was unique for the Pembina Curling Club to have a husband, Alex Mitchell & wife, Betty (Mitchell) Smith as presidents of the men's and the ladies' clubs in 1948-1949.

In 1949 some Scottish curlers came to Winnipeg. They financed their expenses by importing cattle to Canada and selling it here because they were not allowed to take money out of Great Britain. The Pembina Curling Club was incomplete at the time as it had many structural openings. The T. Eaton Company donated a number of flags and some bunting which was draped over the holes. Several years later the ladies made drapes for the upstairs windows in the first club-house. These drapes were sewn in Muriel Cook's basement.

In 1961-1962 Miss Elma Dowling from the Province of London Curling Club, England (one of only two curling clubs in England) came to Winnipeg and joined the Pembina Ladies. She had heard that Winnipeg was a great curling centre. Elma Dowling came equipped with her own curling stones and a brush. She lived at the Pembina Hotel for the duration of her visit.

In 1963 the honour of the city Championship was brought to the Pembina Curling Club.

A milestone in the life of the Pembina Ladies Curling Club was commemorated in 1965-1966. The curling rink was moved onto its present location with new club rooms, a dining area, games room and basement lockers. The grand-opening tea was organized with founder Betty (Mitchell) Smith as Honorary Pourer.

The Pembina Ladies Curling Club to our knowledge, kept minutes prior to 1965-1966 but they have become lost over the years.

During the renovation program and the grand opening of the new facility, things were happening. Emma Osman had the foresight and started the Historian Yearbook for the ladies club. Jen MacDonald hand crafted a cover in copper tooling which was designed by Charlie Hunt. For many years a historian was appointed custodian of the yearbook to record activities and pictures of the year. To this day picture albums are being compiled of our treasured memories.

By 1967, the 20th. Anniversary, the ladies membership had grown to 96 members plus associate members. On January 26th and 27th, 1967 a warm welcome was extended to the M.L.C.A. to host the Zone "A" playdowns.

Double breasted wool sweaters in club colours maroon and gold were introduced in 1968-1969. They were to be worn with maroon or gold slacks.

Mrs. Kay Balcaen was our first member to be elected to the Manitoba Ladies Curling Association Executive. She served as President of the M.L.C.A. in 1961-1962. In 1972-1973 Marion Lynch was elected president of the M.L.C.A. She brought the MacDonald Lassies, the forerunner to the Tournament of Hearts, to Pembina which was held on February 6th to 9th, 1973. She also chaired the MacDonald Lassies held in Winnipeg in 1976. Kay Balcaen in 1962 and Marion Lynch in 1965 became Honourary Life Members of the M.L.C.A. The late Edna Bartmanovich and Pauline Marofke have been on the M.L.C.A. council in recent years.

The first Annual Pembina Ladies Invitational Bonspiel was held in 1966 and continues today. It was initially convened by Eileen Lynch and Betty (Mitchell) Smith.

Some of our members had travelled out of town to bonspiels for many years. It started out as a reciprocating event to host these out of town teams. The Bonspiel consisted of 32 teams with four events. Today there are three events. During the early years Pembina teams would entertain the visiting teams in their homes. Teams came from Northern Ontario, Saskatchewan, North Dakota, Minnesota and rural Manitoba.







## AG ROW CURLING LEAGUE (FORESTRY/AGRICULTURE LEAGUE)

By Bill Turnock with the help of Dick Wong, Warren Timlick and others.

In about 1948, people from the Forest Insect Laboratory, Canada Dept. of Agriculture, located on the University of Manitoba Campus, became interested in having a lab league. Jim Muldrew, Dick Wong, Lionell McDowell and probably Hugh McKinnon volunteered to help the Pembina Curling Club prepare for the curling season. There was snow on the ground inside the rink because the building had been constructed late. The snow had to be shovelled out through the windows before the ice could be made.

Ag Row started with enough curlers for two (2) sheets of ice in their league, made up entirely from the Forestry Department. Although most of the curlers were male, some female curlers were included right from the start. When more sheets became available, curlers from the Dept. of Agri. Rust Research Lab. were asked to join. Bill Hanna and Barney Peterson were among the early curlers. This was the time when some skips smoked cigars and Peterson was one of those that were accused of accidentally dropping ash in front of a draw that was too heavy.

There was rivalry between the two groups and Forestry was at a disadvantage because the staff was smaller. Later, people from the Faculty of Agriculture Department joined the league. Grant Robinson from the Entomology Department was among the first also some from the Plant Science, Animal Science and Agriculture Engineering Departments. In the late 1960's or early 1970's, Grant scored an eight (8) ender. When he made his last shot, he sat down on the bumper and held his head in his hands. The ice area could get very cold, so warm clothing was essential, especially for skips. A plant breeder from the Plant Science Department (Sig Helgason?) curled in a buffalo coat on the cold days.

Many of the curlers would go to the Cambridge Hotel beer parlour after the game and some would regularly stay until it closed. One chap from Forestry did not tell his wife that curling ended in March, but "curled" every Friday night at the Cambridge until it was time to leave town for field work in late April.

Jim Muldrew, Hugh McKinnon, Dick Wong and Lyman Warren entered the Manitoba Bonspiel in 1948 as members of the Pembina Curling Club. Dick remembers that there was only natural ice and many a time he had to wait until midnight for the ice to harden. Instead of going home to rest, all of the team except Jim would go to Drewery's or Shea's Brewery or one of the other brewery's and drink beer until the ice was ready. Jim would go home and his father would come to watch them curl. They did not enhance the Muldrew name at the bonspiel. Jim would give ice and Hugh would shake his head so Jim would change the turn or give more ice. This would continue until Jim asked what he wanted to have. Hugh replied that he was trying to decide which broom to throw the rock at. Note: Hugh had a cast in one eye and couldn't see well at the best of times.

In 1962, the Canadian Forestry Service was formed and staff from the Dominion Forest Service joined the Forest Biologists on campus and in curling. This continued until 1971 when the Winnipeg lab was closed and many of the staff moved to Edmonton, Alberta. Laurie Nairn remained in Winnipeg and continued to curl. Bill Turnock moved to Ottawa and returned in 1972 to the Agriculture Canada Research Station. He and Warren Timlick (retired from the Research Station), continue to curl in the league and date back further than any other curlers.

## PEMBINA BUSINESS GIRLS

In the mid 1960's most daytime curling leagues were more social than competitive. At that time there was a growing trend to form business leagues for women who had joined the work force and/or who wanted to be more competitive. Starting in 1966, some members of the Pembina Ladies Club began investigating the possibility of getting evening ice time for just that reason. In 1969 their wish was met and they began twice weekly curling with one early and one late draw per week. Thus the beginning of the Pembina Business Girls Curling Club with Grace DeCock the first President. In fact, Marg Hudson wrote about the Pembina Business Girls Club in one of her Winnipeg Tribune articles saying "this group will take in its own rinks and, because of the interest shown when the Club was first talked about, a waiting list for membership had to be established last summer".





### **THE VINCENT MASSEY COLLEGIATE CURLING LEAGUE**

The purpose of the league was to introduce students to the sport of curling and train and/or coach teams to participate in the Cloverleaf Championship.

Mr. Gary Martin, currently the head of the Science Department, a curler at the time, approached the Pembina Curling Club on behalf of V.M.C., began a league that continued for eleven years. The mixed (boys & girls) teams won the Cloverleaf Inter-Scholastic Athletic Conference Championship as follows:

Boys: 1964-65, 1967-68, 1969-70, 1971-72.  
Girls: 1970-71, 1971-72.

The Vincent Massey Collegiate Phys-Ed Department currently use Pembina C.C. in a limited way.

### **ST. PAULS LADIES CURLING CLUB**

Starting in 1965-1966 Madeline Buhler, mother of a St. Paul's High School student, started a curling league for the mothers of students and some of their friends. Since no one had curled before, they got a well known curler to come out and coach them to get started. The starting group was called the 'St. Pauls Dolls' and the name stuck for several years changing to its current name in the 1970's.

The connection with St. Pauls School has been lost, but we have carried on as a recreational league, curling every Wednesday morning at the Pembina Curling Club.

Teams are drawn each year so team personnel change annually and welcome new curlers as well as any women interested in recreational curling.

## PEMBINA OLDTIMERS RECREATION ASSOCIATION

### *How It Began:*

At the 1970 spring wind-up of the Pembina Curling Club, Leo Dusessoy, Arthur Johnston and Gordon Ackland were seated at the same table. All of these men were charter members of the club when it was established in 1947. Now that they were getting older and retired, they agreed that they disliked coming out for the 9:30 P.M. games, particularly on cold nights. Leo Dusessoy suggested organizing an afternoon draw for retired men who wanted to curl. Art Johnston and Gordon Ackland agreed that this was a great idea. Responsibilities were assigned as follows: Leo Dusessoy was to arrange for ice; Gordon Ackland was to recruit members, and Art Johnston was to serve as secretary.

At the first meeting in the fall of 1970 the following were elected officers:

President .....	Leo Dusessoy
Secretary .....	Art Johnston
Drawmaster & player personnel .....	Gordon Ackland

A bank account was opened at Fort Garry Trust under the name Pembina Retired Men's Curling Club. The initial deposit was \$34.50.

There were eight (8) curlers in the club in 1970-1971. They rented one sheet of ice and curled twice a week. The players were: Gordon Ackland, Fred Albi, Tony Allan, Bill Calthorpe, Andre Desimpelaere, Leo Dusessoy, Russ Gregory and Art Johnston.

For the 1971-1972 season, additional players were recruited bringing the club membership to twenty one (21) curlers. A second sheet of ice was procured to accommodate four (4) teams. The skips were Leo Dusessoy, Art Johnston, Russ Gregory and Stewart Turner.

At the end of the season there was a play-off between the rink skipped by Leo Dusessoy and that skipped by Art Johnston. Leo Dusessoy's rink was the winner and thus the first club champion.

Season play was followed by a wind-up in the club lounge.

By 1972-1973 membership had increased to twenty four (24) teams.

### *New Horizons Grant*

In 1972 the Government of Canada introduced a program for the benefit of older retired Canadians. This program was known as New Horizons.

At an executive meeting held on January 15th, 1973, it was agreed to apply for a New Horizons grant and to recruit enough curlers to use the six sheets of ice available for afternoon curling.

As a retired civil servant, Jack Chesley took leadership in obtaining information about the New Horizons program. The necessary forms were obtained and an application was made. It was signed by ten (10) members designated as directors. The directors so named were: Leo Dusessoy, A.H. Johnston, J.R. Wilkinson, R.G. Ackland, J.A. Chesley, W.A. McKenzie, J.R. Gillespie, August Horn and H.E. Rogers.

The project was designated as sports for health under the official name of Oldtimers Recreation Association, with headquarters at the Pembina Curling Club., 1341 Pembina Highway.

After several meetings with Mr. L.H.Forest, Regional Director for New Horizons in Western Canada, an application and budget were presented. A start-up grant of \$1,780.00 was awarded for an eighteen (18) month period, to be paid in two installments of \$890.00 each.

The 1973-1974 budget for the club provides information as to the disposition of the first installment of the New Horizons grant:

As the roster book lists fifty two (52) members for 1973-1974, presumably members paid a fee of \$10.00. At least part of the grant was used to cover ice rental.

The report to the Government dated February 11th, 1974 lists expenditures of \$1093.66

### ***Growth Of The Club***

In 1972 when application was made for a New Horizons grant, Jack Chesley was nominated to arrange the advertising for additional curlers. To this end, advertisements were placed in the St. Vital Lance and the sports section of the Winnipeg Free Press.

As a result, sufficient additional curlers were obtained for twelve (12) teams for the 1973-1974 season. Six sheets of ice were rented on a twice a week basis.

The club continued to operate with twelve (12) teams using six sheets of ice twice a week. However, as membership increased there were a large number of associate members and spouses who had very little chance to curl. In 1986-1987 and 1987-1988 some provision was made to accommodate these. It was ascertained that there was an additional sheet of ice available some mornings. Rental of these sheets permitted a number of the associate members to curl once a week.

In 1988-1989 the six sheets of ice were rented three afternoons a week. As a result it was possible for eighteen (18) teams to curl twice a week and thus all those who wanted to, could curl on a regular twice a week basis.

From reports it appears that when the club was first formed, the teams established at the beginning of the season played together all year. As the number of players increased, this practice was discontinued. For many years, new teams have been selected for each round, thus, at present, with four rounds, each player curls with four different teams during the course of the season.

### *Social Activities*

Three times each year, members meet together for a meal in the club rooms of the Pembina Curling Club. The first of these is held in the fall before curling commences. It is followed by the Semi-Annual Business Meeting of the club. The second of these is held in December, a few days before Christmas. In addition to the meal, the activities include door prizes and musical entertainment by club members.

A third dinner is held in the spring after the curling season is over. A major feature at this dinner is the awarding of trophies and the cash prizes. There are three trophies. These were presented to the club many years ago by some of our early members. They are the Leo Dusessoy Trophy, the Jack Chesley Trophy and the Jim Williamson Plaque.

Another aspect of the club activities has been a concern for the sick and the shut-ins. In recent years Abe Friesen has served faithfully in this regard by sending get-well cards on behalf of the membership and by visiting members who are in hospital.

## **PEMBINA ROCKETTES CURLING LEAGUE**

The Pembina Rockettes were founded in 1973. The league was organized to allow women to join teams and to curl once a week during the daytime. Babysitting is available for mothers with young children. The curlers that come every Friday morning meet old and new friends.

Here's a tidbit from the end of the first season (1973). The cost of the prizes which were given to the winners and runners up of each event was less than the cost of the wine served at the wind-up.
